Miss Elsie Meyer, secretary to Leland Olds and title holder to his papers, presented these papers to the Roosevelt Library over a nine-year period extending from 1964 to 1975. Literary property rights in Olds' writings have been donated to the United States government.

Quantity: 132 linear feet (approximately 264,000 pages).

Restrictions: These papers contain documents restricted in accordance with Executive Order 11652. Material which might be used to embarrass, harass, or injure living persons has been closed.

Leland Olds, 1890-1960

Biographical Sketch

Leland Olds was born in Rochester, New York, in 1890. He graduated from Amherst College in 1912, and did post-graduate work at Harvard College and Columbia University. His interest in economic problems, particularly in those of laboring men and women, was early evident in his professional career. During the First World War, he held positions with the Council of National Defense, the Shipbuilding Labor Adjustment Board, and the National War Labor Board. In 1920, he became director of the research bureau of the Railway Employees Department of the American Federation of Labor. He later served as industrial editor of the Federated Press, a labor news service, and as economic consultant to several labor organizations.

In the 1930s, Olds turned his attention to the development of public power. As executive secretary of the Power Authority of the State of New York (1931-39), he took a direct role in the hydro-electric development of the Saint Lawrence River. His interest in this project continued after his appointment in 1939 to the Federal Power Commission. He was one of the negotiators and signers of the 1941 agreement between the United States and Canada regarding the use of the waters in the Great Lakes-Saint Lawrence River Basin, and he was chairman of the United States Saint Lawrence Advisory Committee from 1940 to 1949. Olds served on the Federal Power Commission for two five-year terms, from 1939 to 1949. For about half of this time (1940-44, 1946) he acted as the Commission's chairman.

His close association with the New Deal and with its public power policies made him a controversial figure. Fierce opposition greeted President Truman's nomination of Olds for a third term with the Federal Power Commission. After some rather bruising hearings on the nomination, the Senate voted to reject it.

Olds held several other positions in the Roosevelt Administration. He served with the National Power Policy Committee, and with the Water and Energy Resources Committee of the National Resources Planning Board. He was also a member, in 1936, of the President's commission to study European cooperatives, which assignment resulted in his authoring a report entitled "Inquiry on Cooperative Enterprise in Europe."

President Truman appointed Olds to two posts. Immediately following the unsuccessful Federal Power Commission nomination, he made him the only full-time member of the Water Resources Policy Commission. He also appointed him to serve as the Department of the Interior's representative on the New England and New York Interagency Committee, which had as its charge the study of potential development of land and water resources in that area.

Following his departure from government service in 1953, Olds worked as a staff consultant of the Public Affairs Institute and as a director of the Energy Research Association, an independent consultants' group which he formed in 1954.

Leland Olds died on August 3, 1960.

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1 - 4	Family and Personal Papers. c.1848-1960. 4 Containers.
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Contains early material from Mary P. Adams and Joseph Daniels Leland, maternal grandparents of Leland Olds; also miscellaneous papers, correspondence and academic materials of his father, George D. Olds, mathematics professor and president of Amherst College.

Includes family correspondence between Olds' parents, LO and his wife, Maud, his children, John, Mary, James and Zara and other family members, arranged in chronological order. Most correspondence is between LO and his mother, Marion, 1902-1953.

School memorabilia, as well as legal documents i.e. LO's Army discharge (1918), marriage certificate (1924) and his last will and testament (1945).

5 - 8	General Correspondence: Personal File. 1930-1960. 4 Containers.
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This series does not in any way represent all of LO's correspondence from 1930-1960, nor is it largely personal. Letters to and from LO are scattered throughout practically every series in this collection.

Contains exchanges between LO and various individuals and organizations relative to issues and subjects in which he was interested. Correspondents include: Morris L. Cooke, Senator Paul H. Douglas, Judson King, W. Jett Lauck, Adlai Stevenson, Frank P. Walsh; some organizations represented are: Affiliated Young Democrats, Amherst College, Christian Science Monitor, Democratic National Committee, Liberal Party, National Planning Association, Twentieth Century Fund.

Arranged alphabetically by surname of individual or institution.

9-12      Personal Notebooks, Desk Calendars and Diaries, and Daily Reminders. 1930-1960. 4 Containers.

Notebooks contain LO's comments on various subjects and excerpts from his voluminous daily reading. Reminders are secretary's entries for LO's appointments, meetings, speeches, and luncheons.

Arranged chronologically, although parts of this series are fragmented, i.e. desk calendars, exist for only the years 1933-34; 1943-1944; 1948-1960.

13-15      Federated Press. 1923-1931. 3 Containers.

LO served as industrial editor of and consultant to the Federated Press, a labor news service, 1922-1931. His syndicated column appeared in a number of labor newspapers including the Communist Daily Worker. Contains copies of Federated Press publications and articles arranged chronologically as well as press releases, 1925-1929, arranged by subject.

16-19      New York State Public Service Commission. 1929-1930. 4 Containers.

LO was a member of the Governor's Commission working to revise the Public Service Commission Law. Contains correspondence with Frank P. Walsh, reports, working papers, case studies and exhibits.

20      New York City Taxicab Industry. 1929-1931. 1 Container.

One of the many consultants' positions held by LO during this period was to the Mayor's Commission which was to reorganize the taxicab industry in New York City.

Contains related correspondence, memoranda, clippings, reports, minutes of meetings, and LO's research notes.

- 21            Utility Studies in New York and Canada. 1929-1931.  
              1 Container.

LO worked with Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt on a state program to regulate utilities in New York State and Canada while simultaneously working on a similar program in Wisconsin. Correspondence with Governor Roosevelt and Samuel Rosenman, notes and data on New York State legislation and the Wisconsin District Utilities Bills.

- 22            Farm Plan. 1929-1933. 1 Container.

With Mary Harriman Rumsey, the Community Councils of New York City and others, LO tried to relieve unemployment by planning self-help cooperative farm communities.

Includes data on farm activities in selected states, information on existing agricultural cooperatives and the American Farm Foundation, correspondence, memos, notes and miscellaneous printed matter.

- 23            Community Councils of the City of New York. 1930-1943.  
              1 Container.

LO was active in and served as consultant to this group which advocated citizen participation in public affairs.

Correspondence, minutes of meetings, data on proposals and programs, speech material and yearbooks for 1933, 1936 and 1943.

- 24-26        Power Authority of the State of New York. 1930-1954.  
              3 Containers.

LO was assistant to Chairman, Frank P. Walsh and later executive secretary to the Power Authority 1930-1939. His responsibility for the work of the Authority in U.S.-Canadian relations is reflected here.

Reports, publications, records of conversations and conferences with Canadian representatives on St. Lawrence Power, Communications with the White House and State Department 1936-1938; also Governor Roosevelt's Utility Messages of 1930, a small amount of correspondence 1931-1939, annual reports 1931-1954 and LO's notes and memos.

27-28      Miscellaneous. 1930-1958. 2 Containers.

Material in this file consists of various and unrelated subjects arranged chronologically.

I. AE Lecture Tour, 1930-1931.

Poet and protagonist of the communal movement in Ireland, AE (George Russell) conducted a lecture tour in the U.S. on European cooperatives. LO organized the tour and accompanied AE. Includes miscellaneous correspondence, itineraries, copies of lectures, publications and press clippings.

II. Atlantic City Gas Co. Rate Schedule, 1931.

LO was a private consultant for Samuel Morris, an Atlantic City attorney. Contains LO's file notes on the study.

III. Progressives for FDR, 1936.

Includes lists of sponsors, literature and copies of speeches used to support Roosevelt in the campaign of 1936.

IV. American Labor Party, 1936-1941.

LO was active in the American Labor Party and served as temporary chairman of its convention in New York City in 1938. Contains correspondence, minutes of meetings, campaign speech made by Olds and publicity materials.

V. League for Industrial Democracy, 1937-1958.

Correspondence with Harry Laidler, Executive Director of the League, notes and speeches of LO and miscellaneous printed materials concerned with the League.

VI. Proposal on LO's Appointment as Minister to Canada, 1938

Correspondence of McIntyre to Carrol, January 14, 1938.

VII. Cooperative Forum, 1947-1949.

Newsletters, lists of speakers and subjects, financial statement of Forum.

VIII. American Friends Service Committee, 1949.

Reports (2) on American-Russian relations prepared by Friends Committee.

29-30	Emergency Exchange Association. 1932-1934. 2 Containers

LO and Mary Harriman Rumsey were co-chairmen of this organization created to eliminate unemployment through cooperative activities.

Correspondence, constitution and by-laws of the organization, planning documents and reports on programs.

31	Tennessee Valley Authority. 1933-1948. 1 Container
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Materials concerning the TVA are scattered throughout many series in the collection, but this material was segregated by Olds' secretary.

Contains the TVA Report to the Nation 1933-1948, reports 1934-1937, miscellaneous correspondence including exchanges with David Lilienthal 1942-1944, the Rankin manuscript on TVA with Olds' drafts and revisions, and LO's memo: "Alabama Power Co. Yardstick," 1938.

32-40	European Cooperatives Study. 1936-1937. 9 Containers.
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LO was a member of President Roosevelt's committee to study consumer cooperatives in the British Isles and Scandinavia in March, 1937.

Includes invitations from foreign governments, correspondence among members of the committee and others, memoranda, itineraries, notes, preliminary and final drafts of a report to FDR, newspaper clippings, and printed materials arranged alphabetically by country studied.

41-43	Federal Power Committees, 1938-1944. 4 Containers.
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LO represented the Secretary of the Interior on the National Defense Power Committee, 1938-1939; he was vice-chairman of the National Power Policy Committee, 1939-1944; also, member of the Special Committee on European Power Problems, 1943-1944.

LO's notes and memos, related correspondence, reports, minutes of meetings and utilities conferences, plans and power programs.

National Resources Planning Board. 1939-1944.  
10 Containers.

From 1939 to 1943, LO was a member of the Water and Energy Resources Committees of the National Resources Planning Board.

Largely working reports of these committees arranged chronologically, committee meetings minutes, plans for energy programs.

55-57

Contacts With the President. 1939-1953. 3 Containers.

Contains material related to specific subjects such as: the Defense Power Program 1939-1943, St. Lawrence Seaway Treaty Negotiations, 1939-1949; the Federal Power Commission, 1939-1949; also, miscellaneous memoranda of LO to Presidents Roosevelt and Truman and invitations received by him to attend presidential functions.

St. Lawrence Advisory Commission. 1939-1953.  
18 Containers.

LO was appointed chairman of this Commission by President Roosevelt October, 1940. He helped negotiate the formal agreement with Canada in 1941 to deepen the St. Lawrence waterway and develop hydroelectric power.

Contains historical data on U.S.-Canadian relations, survey studies, correspondence, notes, memos, presidential memos, treaty drafts, press releases and congressional committee hearings.

St. Lawrence-Niagara. 1939-1960. 7 Containers.

The relationship between the above series and this one is obvious although the material in this section deals chiefly with legislation related to Niagara power development.

Includes historical notes, correspondence, memos to LO from FDR and Berle, Army Corps of Engineers reports, New York Power Authority and Vermont Cooperatives contracts, congressional hearings, statements, speeches and newspaper clippings.

73-161      Federal Power Commission. 1939-1960. 89 Containers.

LO was appointed to the Federal Power Commission in 1939 by President Roosevelt and served as chairman 1940 to 1944 and 1946 until his second term expired. His renomination by President Harry S. Truman was rejected by the United States Senate in 1949.

This series is organized into 12 parts:-

I. Nomination and Reappointment of Leland Olds, 1939-1949  
(4 Containers).

Congratulatory messages and correspondence, miscellaneous notes, memos and data used at Olds' congressional hearings 1939, 1944. The 1949 materials include correspondence with President Truman, general correspondence, presentation materials, statements from witnesses, committee reports, radio interviews (LO's), the New York Post article series, report of the Senate proceedings, and newspaper clippings.

II. General Files, 1939-1949. (19 Containers).

These files comprise a large segment of the materials and correspondence that crossed LO's desk as chairman of the FPC. Arranged alphabetically.

III. Daily News Digest, 1939-1949. (9 Containers).

An in-house organ that provided a daily account of FPC activities, June 26, 1939 through 1949.

IV. National Defense and War Power Requirements, 1939-1947.  
(8 Containers).

The role and activities of the FPC in war power supply as an integral part of national defense are reflected in these files. Reports, studies, conference minutes, plans and proposals which the Commission worked on during the war era. Arranged alphabetically by subject.

V. Cases and Court Decisions, 1939-1955. (7 Containers).

Materials relating to FPC docketed cases supervised by LO. Arranged alphabetically by case name.

VI. River Basin Studies, 1939-1960. (13 Containers).

Files of FPC's River Basin Division created by Flood Control and River-Harbor Acts in cooperation with the Corps of Engineers. Arranged alphabetically by river name.

VII. Interconnection Studies. 1940; 1958. (2 Containers).

Reports and activities of the FPC regional offices.

VIII. Congressional Hearings, 1940-1949; 1956  
(6 Containers).

Chiefly, printed materials relating to House and Senate bills in which the FPC had a direct interest. Arranged chronologically.

IX. Power Market Surveys, 1942-1950. (3 Containers).

FPC reports prepared at the request of state governors, district engineers and/or others for use in studying present and future electric power supplies. Arranged alphabetically.

X. Natural Gas Files, 1942-1949; 1953-1960. (7 Containers).

Correspondence, statistical data, reports and evaluations relating to natural gas; also files dealing with the affairs of specific gas and electric companies. Most materials 1953-1960 deal with amendments to the Natural Gas Act and committee hearings relating to them.

XI. Natural Gas Investigation G-580, 1944-1960.  
(9 Containers).

Materials concerning the Congressional investigations of the natural gas industry accompanied by copies of hearings, testimonies, statements, exhibits, newspaper clippings, and articles. Arranged chronologically.

XII. Miscellaneous Printed Materials, 1939 and c.f.  
(2 Containers)

Printed matter sent to LO and bound FPC materials.

In 1949, LO's was a contributor and participant in the United Nations Scientific Conference on Conservation and Utilization of Resources.

Materials include a record of the plenary meetings of this conference, Olds' papers and the papers of other participants, bound volume of materials concerning water resources, and printed U.N. matter including New Sources of Energy and Economic Development (1957) and Integrated River Basin Development (1958)

163-180                  General Current File. c.1950-1960. 18 Containers.

Many topics found herein are also treated elsewhere but these files emphasize LO's continuing interest and activity in public utility regulation, regional development, hydropower, conservation and a national water policy. Additionally, there are research files on a variety of bills prepared by LO for members of Congress, correspondence, reports, studies and informational data, etc. Arranged alphabetically.

181-196                  President's Water Resources Policy Commission. 1950-1951. 16 Containers. \*

From 1950-1951, LO served on the Water Resources Policy Commission established by President Truman. As Commissioner-in-Charge-of-Studies, he supervised the preparation of the Commission's three-volume report: A Water Policy for the American People (Vol.1), Ten Rivers in America's Future (Vol. 2), Water Resources Law (Vol. 3).

LO's working files are arranged alphabetically by topic or name of correspondent. Also, three notebooks containing source material and notes on personnel, minutes of various committee meetings, commission mid-year reports, memoranda, summaries of views and recommendations, evaluations and LO's working drafts of chapter on "Power" for the Commission's report.

197-216      New England-New York Inter-Agency Committee. 1951-1953; 1953-1960. 20 Containers.

As representative of the Secretary of Interior 1951-1953, LO became a member of the New England-New York regional interagency committee charged with surveying land and water resources submitting a comprehensive report with recommendations. He was Director of the Northeast Field Staff and coordinated the work of the Bureau of Mines, National Park Service, Fish and Wildlife Service, and the Geological Survey Group.

The Inter-Agency Committee Files, 1951-1953 and the New England General Files, 1953-1960 are arranged alphabetically by topic. The comprehensive report, Resources of the New England-New York Region is contained in bound volumes. Chapter headings are found in the Container List.

217-218      Special Reports and Studies. 1952-1960. 2 Containers.

Series includes projects LO worked on either because of his special interest, e.g. the Democratic Party 1956, 1960 or because he was hired to research problems for individuals or companies, e.g. John F. Kennedy and the Mid-West Electric Consumers Association. Arranged alphabetically.

219-228      Public Affairs Institute. 1953-1959. 10 Containers.

In 1953, LO joined the Public Affairs Institute in Washington, D.C. as a staff consultant.

Materials include transitional correspondence 1953, general correspondence 1953-1959, memoranda, reports and working files related to several research studies, e.g.: Atomic Energy, Hells Canyon, and Dixon-Yates. Topically arranged and thereunder alphabetically.

229-241      Energy Research Associates. 1954-1961. 13 Containers.

From 1954 until his death in 1960, LO was Director of Energy Research Associates, a private research group which he founded as an affiliate of the Public Affairs Institute.

Largely, administrative and financial files dealing with contributions, expenditures, fund raising, personnel, minutes of meetings, organizational data, etc. Also several working files related to "Giant Power" and the South Dakota Rate Studies. Arranged topically and thereunder alphabetically.

Although this file contains most of LO's speeches and writings, additional materials as well as copies of speeches and articles are scattered throughout the papers.

Materials in the Speech File are arranged in the following manner: Speeches - Personal File, 1908-1960 (Vols. 1-4 bound); Speeches and Related Correspondence, 1908-1960; Speeches, 1941-1960; Speech Requests Unfilled, 1939-1958; Miscellaneous Speeches by Others, 1948-1949; Selected Speech Materials, 1938-1960 (topical arrangement).

LO's Writings Files c.1898 to 1960 are arranged chronologically. Included are his miscellaneous school writings, the manuscript of his doctoral dissertation, "From Jacobin to Boleshevik" with notes and working papers, course and teaching notes, lectures, research data, topical notes relating to labor and economic problems, articles, drafts, book reviews, requests for articles and books refused, undated writings and miscellaneous notes for books and reminiscences. Also includes articles written about Olds.

262      Tributes, Testimonials and Awards. 1941-1959. 1 Container.

Includes commendations and tributes from the American Power Association, the Federal Power Commission, the Executive Committee of the Electric Consumers Information Committee; also the John Dewey Award from the League for Industrial Democracy. A book of letters from eminent Americans (ECIC, 1959) contains messages from Harry S. Truman, Eleanor Roosevelt, John Sparkman, Ordway Tead, Horace Gray, Lowell Mellett, and Herbert Lehman.
